waste: I throw waste in the bin.

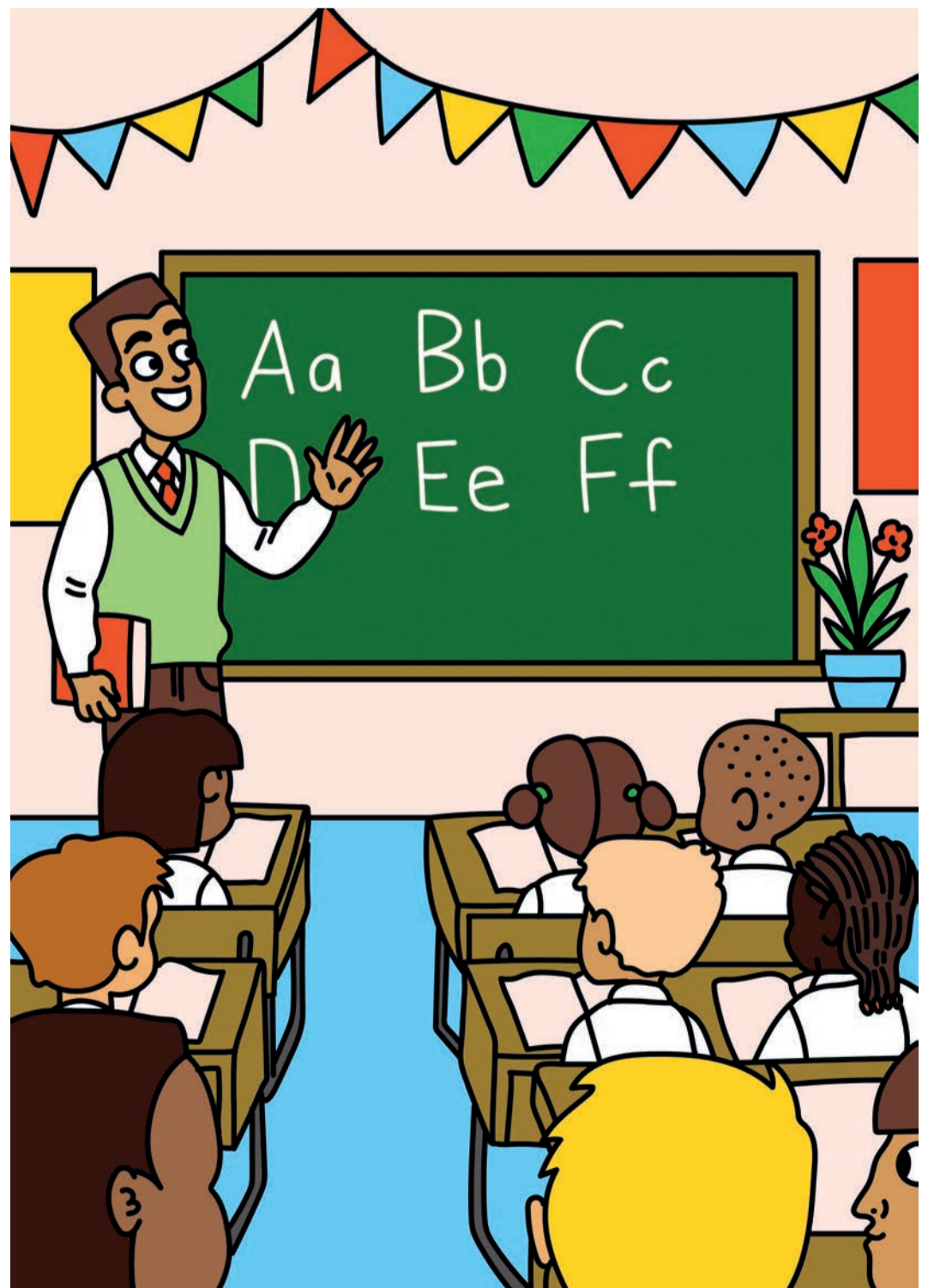
I have the right to a family. I should be loved and cared for.





My responsibility is to love my family. I must respect the elderly, too.

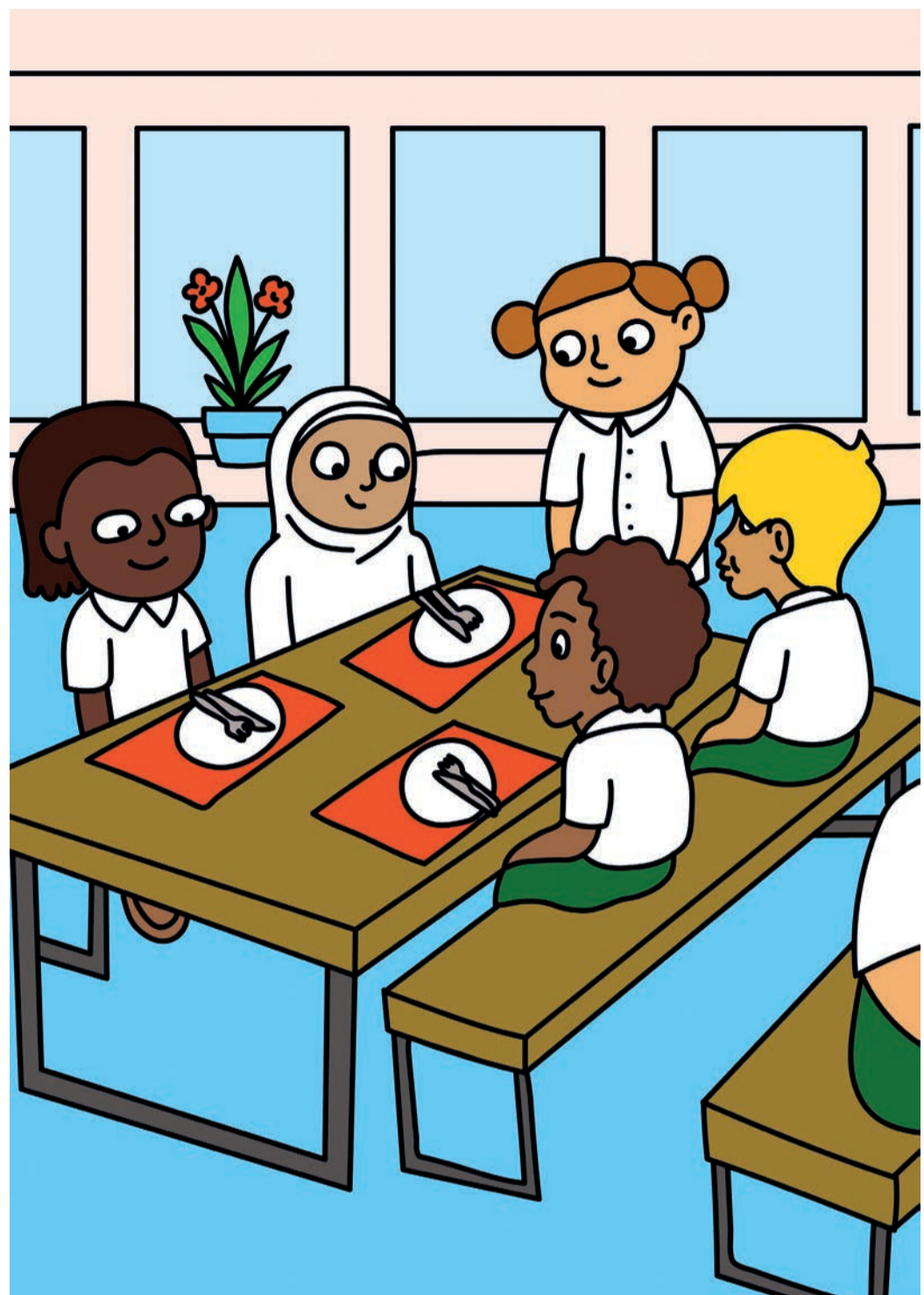
I have the right to education. I have a right to go to school every day. My responsibility is to learn. I must work hard and respect my teachers.
